Overview

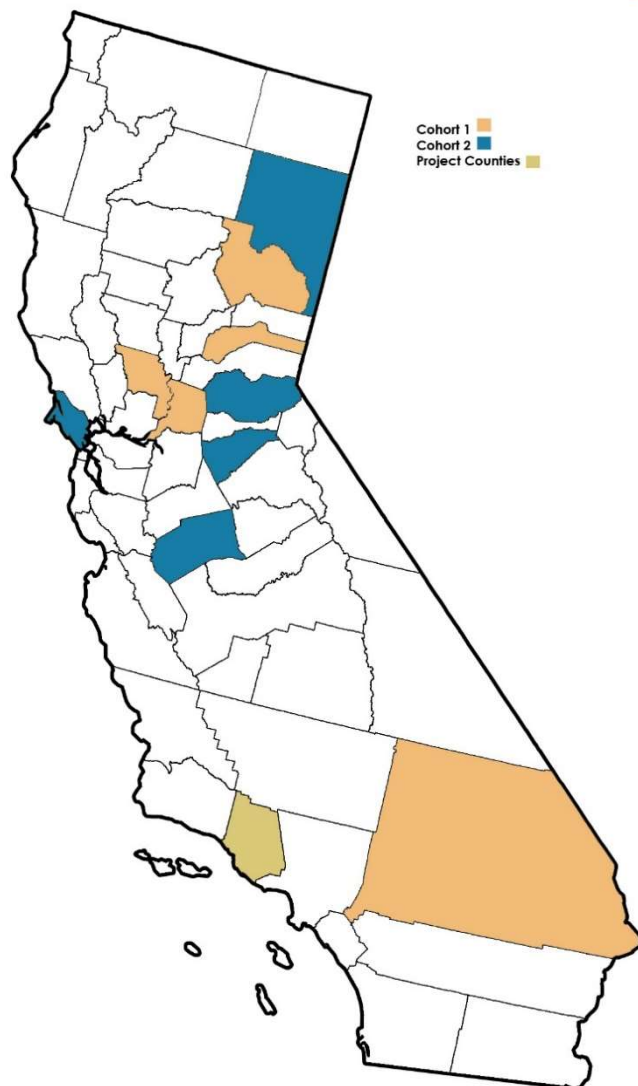
The Data Driven Recovery Project ("DDRP") is a new initiative supported by Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) funds for counties to improve outcomes for behavioral health clients in the criminal justice system.

The DDRP offers ten Counties, led by Yolo County, an opportunity to identify informed strategies for reducing the incidence, duration, and recurrence of arrests and incarcerations of people with behavioral health conditions.

How does it work?

DDRP will accomplish this through improved use and appropriate sharing of data about the behavioral health needs of people in contact with or at increased risk of contact with the criminal justice system.

1. The DDRP supports counties in developing an individualized set of analytic tools to assist in identifying programmatic and systemic innovations in their county through system mapping and the improvement of data resources that connect across agencies.
2. In addition, the DDRP facilitates small inter-county workgroups that can develop operational definitions, materials, programming coding, and build on individual county experiences.

County specific project work plans may include:

- **Technical expertise in merging cross-agency data** to identify clients in multiple systems for the purpose of research and analysis
- **A data strategy to align data systems** and merge information in an ongoing way
- **Development baselines and inform decisions** for justice-involved youth via facilitated workgroups or other engagements
- **Creating of process maps** to inform areas for system improvement and client connections.
- **Development a system program inventory** to inform system resources, gaps, and priorities.
- **Analysis of caseloads and funding plans** to understand system impacts.
- **Development of dashboards** to better share and understand data insights
